Rescue Objectives

The BCA Rescue Network is organized into local "rescue groups" of one or more individuals who are working toward these objectives:

- To accept Bulldogs whose owners can no longer keep them, and find responsible, stable, loving new homes for them.
- To rehabilitate Bulldogs before placement by providing necessary medical treatment and training to increase the chances of successful placement.
- To help reduce the population of unwanted pets by ensuring that all rescued Bulldogs are spayed/neutered before being placed.
- To place Bulldogs in suitable homes as soon as reasonably possible, so they can start their "new lives" quickly.
- To thoroughly screen applicants before making placement decisions.
- To inform prospective adoptive families about the rescue program and the requirements for taking care of bulldogs.

How to help



Just as there are a variety of rescue situations; there are also many ways to be a part of the rescue effort...

- Become a foster home. These rescuers provide temporary homes during evaluation and before placement in the bully's "forever home".
- Become an adoptive home, and love a bully for the rest of his/her life!
- Become a rescue network volunteer, There are home checks that need doing, booths that need manning, transportation that needs to happen etc. etc.
- Donate funds. There are many expenses involved in rescuing bullies
- Write your lawmakers. There are many situations that could be improved by proper legislation.

More ways to become involved

- Report abuse. Cruelty is everybody's business.
- Be responsible. If you can no longer keep a bully, make sure it is placed properly. Consider surrendering to rescue rather than placing him/her in a pound
- Donate food, medications, equipment and supplies to a local Bulldog rescue group
- Take the time to become educated. Know the difference between a BCA referred breeder, a back yard breeder, a broker and a puppy mill...Do not stimulate the market for poorly bred animals by buying pups from people not qualified to breed.
