Rodney Rosador (62859), the subject of our supplement this month, is one of the cloddiest bulldogs under forty-five pounds that we have on the bench today. Mr. Hopton imported him in August, 1902. He made his debut at the Toronto Fair, the same month winning four (4) firsts, winners and the championship medal for best in show. Among his other wins are three firsts and winners, Middletown; three firsts, winners and two silver cups, Wissahickon; including special for best bulldog in show. First, New York, in a good class of nineteen entries; firsts and cup, Newark; first and medal, Pittsburg; three firsts and winners, Binghamton; Vancroft Medal for best in show, Chicago, and the Lawson special of one hundred dollars for best in show, Boston. Rosador is a mahogany brindle, with good ears, massive head and bone, and is low and cobby in body.
