14. \$5 cup for stud dog having the greatest number of get to win a first, second or third prize at said show. In case of reserve being given instead of third prize, then reserve to count as third. Get to be American.

15. \$5 cup for brood bitch having the greatest number of produce to win a first, second or third prize at said show. In case of reserve being given instead of third prize, then reserve to count as third. Produce to be American bred.

The above stakes and cups are open to members of the Irish Terrier Club

Every dog and bitch competing must be registered in the American Kennel

Club Stud Book.

The term "American bred" is to be construed as meaning a dog or bitch whelped in the United States or Canada, and in the case of a bitch served out of the United States or Canada, she must have been owned and in the United States or Canada prior to such service to make her produce eligible to connecte.

The interpretation of the above shall be left to the Committee on Specials,

whose award shall be final.

Judge's Reports of the Pan-American Show.

Collies.

Collies, rough, were, taken as a whole, not a very high-class collection, and not numerous-all more or less showing the ravages of the summer weather, put down with ragged coats and those that had been groomed out with scarcely any. The winning puppy was a very ordinary specimen, Mr. Jarrett's entry in this class being absent. Novice dogs were mostly an imported lot, the majority of them well known on the "other side," although meeting here for the first time. The winner, Wellesbourne Hope, is a well and racily built young dog, with a long, clean head, flat skull and good ears, shown light in flesh, and just beginning to grow his coat. Parkhill Squire, second, shown in good condition and coat, very much behind the winner in head, ears and expression, and but for his excellent coat would have had to give way to Logan's King Edward VII., built on the same lines as the winner, better in head, ears and front than Squire, but shown in very poor coat. Beacon Eclipse, Res., is a big, useful-looking dog, but is wide in skull and low in ear. Ohio Hope (Ben Gharda), V. H. C., also in poor coat, has a good head, nice outlook and was shown in good condition, but has, at times, one bad ear. Bobbs, V. H. C., has a clean head of nice type, but is low in ear and light in body. The puppy winner got C. here.

Limit and open were a repetition of novice. In winners, Wellesbourne Hope was first with Parkhill Squire, Res. Bitches-puppies had only one entry, a tri-color, nice head and ears, and coming into coat, good body, legs and feet. She was second in novice to Trilby, of Maplegrove, a nice quality bitch, with fair head, good ears, good in body and coat. Brookside Farm Minnie, third, is a big, well-developed bitch, shown in poor coat; has good ears, and with a flatter skull could have made it interesting for the whole lot. In limit, Lady Lauriston won easily, a sweet bitch of nice type, showing much character in head and expression; not in very good coat, and ears could be a trifle higher. Trilby of M. was second, and Beacon Princess, third. First and second in open went to the limit winners, third going to Tixey, of Maplegrove, gone a little in head, ears still good, shown in nice coat and condition, but a bit wide in front.

Smooths—Wellesbourne Veto, well-known, was shown in splendid condition, and stood entirely apart from his son and daughter, a very ordinary pair.

Bulldogs.

Bulldogs opened with novice dogs, first, Beau Brummel, a big-headed brindle, whose chief faults are want of layback and more depth of brisket. Fireworks was absent.

Limit dogs, 45 pounds and over, first, the new importation, Portland, a much improved dog since I awarded him his first championship at the Bulldog Club

show, in London, last year. He has improved in shoulder and wrinkle, and, is today one of the finest and most sound dogs I have had the pleasure of judging. Second, Mersham Jock, shown in good condition. He has improved in head, but is inclined to dip a trifle too much behind the shoulder. Third, Don Juan, looking as bright as ever. Woodcote Jumbo was absent.

Limit dogs, under 45 pounds-First, King Solomon, a taking brindle and white, with good head, small rose ears and good finish of face, a little more wrinkle, however, would improve his expression; has wide chest and short, compact body, but is a trifle too loose at elbow. Second, Rodney Grabber, a massive Fawn Smut. He has a large skull, big nose and well-finished face, grand front and shoulder, but shown a trifle too light in flesh. He should improve. Third, General French, a new importation, the best-headed dog in the class, but is too high on leg and weak in hocks. From his breeding he should prove a good sire. V. H. C., Rubber Neck, a good-headed brindle, plain in body and too high strung for a show dog. His worthy owner should keep him home.

Open dogs, first, Portland; second, King Solomon; third, Mersham Jock; reserve, Orient Don, looking wonderfully fit.

serve, King Solomon.

Bitch—puppies, first, Sabrinius, a promising Brindle and white.

Novice bitches, first, a new importa-tion, Yorkshire Relish, whom I will seak of later; second, Remlik Dutchess Salano, a dark brindle, with a deep skull and well-placed ears; wants more turn up, stop and depth of body. Third, Rhoda Stone, a new importation, who certainly has been much over-rated in the English press. She is a dark brindle, who at first glance impresses you, but on closer examination, sadly lacks quality. She is wry-faced, very weak in shoulder, dips in back, and Her redeeming she gets her tail up. features are her good-shaped skull, wellplaced ears, wide chest and cloddiness. Extra third, Rodney Vivandiere, a cloddy, dark brindle, with very nice head and cobby body. Reserve, Rodnev Mercia, a grand-headed one, who might have been second, but was shown far too thin. V. H. C., Lady Queer Street, a massive fawn, who should prove a good "mater." V. H. C., Bonamour, a massive brindle and white, with big skull and bone, but is downfaced and long in back. V. H. C., Ashton Queen, a fair brindle pied.

Limit bitches, 40 pounds and over, first, Remlik Sweet Signora, a massive dark brindle; wants more finish of face and wider front; shown in good condition. Second, Rodney Mercia; third, Lady Barber, a good stamp, but wants more layback. Reserve, Shaftesbury Fidget, a brindle with good substance, but a trifle shelly in body and plain in face.

Limit bitches, under 40 pounds, a good class of ten. First, Yorkshire Relish; second, the Chicago winner, Woodcote Bright Eyes, a grand little fawn; has a good skull and big, square
