He was then rather raw and unfurnished, but being well handled by his worthy breeder, Mr. C. S. Chaundler, he got Third. His next appearance was at Wimbledon Show, in September, a much improved dog, but here he was treated rather badly. Mr. Pegg was so impressed with him, however, that on the advice of the writer he purchased him, paying a then record price for a puppy.

Chinosal was taken around to the leading shows and won five championships before he was eighteen months old, beating all the best dogs in England.
