Mrs. Sherman Hoyt offers a trophy for best grown dog in the match and Warren H Blaisdell, III offers a trophy for best puppy in the match. The entry fee is set at one dollar for the first entry and fifty cents for each additional entry. Dogs may be entered in as many classes as they are eligible for.

Judging will start at 2.00 P.M. After the judging, dinner will be served with a choice of roast beef or chicken. A private bar will be provided for the Club's use as well as music for dancing after the judging. There is no charge for admission so it is hoped that all bulldoggers in the metropolitan area will be on hand to have a good time and help make this first match show of the "new" Bulldog Club of America a big success.

The 1946 Specialty Show of the Bulldog Club of America will be held in conjunction with the all breed show at Katonah, N.Y. in June, subject to approval by the AKC. The judge will be announced next month.

The Morris and Essex Kennel Club has announced that it will restrict its entries to a total of only 30 breeds in 1946, and we are glad to be informed that Bulldogs will be one of the lucky ones. The Bulldog Club of America will heartily support this great show which was missed so much by all fanciers during the war.
