

ENGLISH BULLDOG DEFEATS OLD RIVAL

Thomas W. Lawson's Dreamwold Centaur Beats Strathtay Prince Albert on Bench.

Thomas W. Lawson's Dreamwold Centaur, a handsome large black and white English bulldog, again lowered the colors of Alexander H. Stewart's Strathtay Prince Albert at the sixth annual open show of the Bulldog Breeders' Association of America, which was held yesterday in the show rooms of the Grand Central Palace. Centaur was in splendid shape and there was little hesitation on the part of Judge Allison M. Lederer in giving the first prize to him in preference to Strathtay Prince Albert, which took the highest honors not only in his class, but also among all the dogs at the Westminster Show in February. This is the second time since that show that Lawson's bull has taken the laurels away from his rival on the bench, the first time being at the Chicago show a week after the Westminster event.

In selecting the winners among the dogs, Dreamwold Blunderbuss, exhibited yesterday by Arnold Lawson, was chosen. Like the other Dreamwold dogs, Blunderbuss was in the pink of condition. His red faun coat shone and his splendid short face and exceptional jaw made him easily the feature of the exhibition. As reserve to Dreamwold Blunderbuss, Dreamwold Centaur was chosen, again outpointing Strathtay Prince Albert.

W. Beardsley Judson, exhibiting his Judborn Kennel beauties, won a host of prizes, the most important of which was carried off by his cup winning Judborn Trained Nurse. She won without much deliberation in her class of open bitches and outpointed all when it came to the selection of the winner among the bitches. The many prizes were carried together with the winners to Judson in his invalid's chair, and he thoroughly enjoyed the honors won by his kennels.

One of the features of the show was the exceptional offering among the puppy bitches. Never in the history of the show has there been such splendid puppies shown. There were fifteen in the ring, and all were deserving of mention. The winner, Paul Scardon's Beaming Belle, by Baron Beaming and Parkhurst Pam, took the show by storm. She is a beautiful light brindle, well shaped throughout, and with a jaw that will go a long way toward putting her among the best in another year. She was easily the peer of them all. She added to her honors by drawing the reserve position to Judborn Trained Nurse.

Of almost the same class was William T. Drew's Drewstone Pike, by Tall Bar Pike and Lady White Foot, which took the first place among the puppy dogs. These two puppies made a beautiful pair.

Dreamwold Blunderbuss won the Judge's Cup for the best dog in the show, with Dreamwold Centaur second. In the same competition for the best bitch Judson's Judborn Trained Nurse won first and Dreamwold Juanita came second. The latter selection came as a surprise, as Lawson's Dreamwold Juanita had been considered the better of the two.

Lawton Roorbach's Bill Cerberus, by

Cerberus and Highland Lassie, drew the honors for the best American bred dog over forty-five pounds, while the Slongo Kennel's Robinswood Pindarus, by Gotham Lord Beresford and Wroxham Merina, won among the dogs under that weight. In the same classes among the bitches Walter Murray's Thornebury Pearl and E. Cook's Mlle. Modiste were the winners. The latter is one of the finest American bred bitches in the country, and is still in fine shape in spite of her age. She has been a big prize winner for her kennel. The summaries:
