## OAK NANA TAKES BULLDOG TROPHY

Rockcliffe Kennels Championship Entry Wins Another Title at McAlpin Show.

Bulldogs of assorted sizes and various shapes were on exhibition all day yes-The octerday at the McAlpin Hotel. casion was the annual show of the Joint Bulldog Clubs of America.

The winter garden of the hotel, where was held, was show throughout the day with admirers of this popular breed. The uglier the specimen the larger the crowd that surrounded its bench.

Over ninety dogs were judged, and while these represented a few of the best kennels in this part of the country, there was an absence of those topnotchers which are always so prominent at the Westminster Kennel Club Exhibitions.

There were a number of new exhibitors, and the outstanding feature of the event was the fine showing made by the American-bred dogs. Charles Scardon's Beaming Belle, bred by its owner, took the reserve in the winners' class when she beat a number of prom-

inent champion bitches.

The blue went to Rockcliffe Kennels, Champion Oak Nana, which was adjudged the best dog in the show. This is no new title for Oak Nana, as it has frequently had this honor thrust upon it before, as the Rockcliffe Kennels' entry has numerous times been adjudged the best of any breed at many important shows. This makes the third

championship for Oak Nana.

The bitch is pure white, beautifully bodied, with a very short face, good wide flat skull and a big sweep of under jaw. She is owned by John T. Minturn. Baron Beaming, the father of Beaming Belle, was adjudged the best dog of the opposite sex. This prize winner is owned by Allison Lederer of

East Williston, Long Island. He is a large heavyweight, with a splendid body, but a slight defect in the face

and poor legs. Many of the spectators were of the opinion that the "best dog in the show" should have gone to the Rockcliffe Kennels' entry, Rockcliffe Lord Brilliant, which has been in this country only eighteen months, but has never been shown before, but the judge, in placing Champion Baron Beaming first did not do so before a careful and thorough examination of the two dogs. Lord Brilliant has bad eyes and is swaybacked and has very poor teeth. The awards:

Brooklyn Schoolboys Win Triangular Run in Prospect Park.

Cross-country runners of Erasmus Hall High School triumphed in a trlangular match with teams from Yonkers High School and Far Rockaway High over the three-mile course at Prospect Park, Brooklyn, yesterday. A two-point margin gave the victory to Erasmus over Yonkers, the scores being 27 and 29, respectively. Far Rockaway was a poor third, with 96 points.

The individual honors were won by Harry Russell of Yonkers, who journeyed over the three-mile trail in 19 minutes 15 seconds, leading by almost 200 yards F. Loomis of Erasmus, who finished second. Earl McRay, another Yonkers standard bearer, breasted the tape 7 seconds after Loomis.

Russell led from start to finish, and his advantage was never threatened after the first mile by any of the fifty starters. The summary:
